Inquiring into your own practice

Effective Social Science teachers inquire into the teaching-learning relationship; they think about how they are teaching and whether it is working. This can be moment by moment as teaching takes place, day to day, or over a longer term as it occurs when using a teaching as inquiry approach.

As you inquire into your own teaching it may be useful to look at the Senior Social Studies curriculum guide for concise yet supportive ideas around Teaching as Inquiry. This area of the curriculum guide will guide and give examples of useful questions to ask yourself when inquiring into your practice. Although it is part of the Senior Social Studies learning area, it is applicable to anyone, in any learning area:

Media gallery - Social Science middle leaders share

The media gallery on TKI has many useful videos of teachers explaining what has been useful and supportive for their learners. Here is a snapshot of two Social Science middle leaders talking about what has been successful for them.

Andrew Savage, HOD History at Wellington College, discusses how his department decided to place ideas at the centre of their courses. Andrew explains that history is a contested topic and there are multiple ways of understanding the past. Therefore, they engage students with rich questions that offer no answers, incorporate complex ideas, and ask the students to make decisions based on investigating the past and their own interpretations of the past.

Andrew also discusses ways that he encourages his students to be partners in their learning.
