2013 Assessment Reports

The 2013 Assessment Reports are now available. These provide invaluable insights into what is needed to meet the requirements of the External Achievement Standards. Exemplars of student work from 2013 examinations are also available. Consider how these could be used by the students, for example, working with an Achieved answer and making it into a Merit and then Excellence response.

Moderation of internally assessed Achievement Standards

Literacy in a Learning Languages classroom

The New Zealand Curriculum has a vision of confident, connected, actively involved and lifelong learners. These learners are literate and numerate; critical and creative thinkers; active seekers, users and creators of knowledge and informed decision making.

What better way of fulfilling this vision than by learning a language. As Scarino wrote in 2000:

"Learning languages in a school setting involves developing learners' capabilities for both using language and learning language. Learners need to learn how to learn and how to learn a language. Even more important is that they develop higher order thinking skills and that they perceive the important relationship between thought, language and knowledge."

This <u>TKI ESOL online</u> link provides some excellent teaching strategies which language teachers can be using in their classrooms to support and scaffold teaching and learning in the development of literacy skills. For example, <u>brainstorming</u>. This can be done in the target language and allows for prior learning to be focused on.

A number of these activities can be successfully completed digitally by using web 2 tools, such as Mindmup.

Like language learning, digital literacy moves beyond functional skills to embrace digital behaviours, practices and identities. Because there are constant changes, skills are not enough, and what is needed is a set of professionally situated practices that are supported by the diverse technologies available. This idea is also outlined in the NZC 'elearning' as learning and teaching that is facilitated by or supported through the appropriate use of information and communication technologies (ICTs). Whatever the technology, however, learning is the vital element. E-Learning is not simply associated with modes of delivery or the functionality of a particular technology, but forms part of a conscious choice of the best and most appropriate ways of promoting effective learning.



New Zealand Association of Language Teachers (NZALT)

The following report from Martin East, President of NZALT summarises the Conference.

The 40th anniversary conference of the New Zealand Association of Language Teachers (NZALT) took place in Palmerston North between 6th and 9th July, with almost 200 people in attendance at various points. A broad range of themes of interest to languages teachers was explored by five keynote addresses alongside a variety of parallel sessions. The overarching theme of the conference was 'languages give you wings'. There was remarkable synergy among the keynotes who explored different dimensions of learning how to fly with languages, including: why should people learn another language? How do you learn another language? How do languages teachers view themselves? How do we best promote intercultural reflection? How do we most effectively assess proficiency? There was truly something for everyone at this significant professional learning and development event, and feedback to the organisers confirms that the conference was well received.
