Reflecting on the use of e-Learning



The New Zealand Curriculum and Te Marautanga o Aotearoa set out a vision for all of our young people to become confident, connected, actively involved lifelong learners.

The information and resources on the Enabling e-Learning website demonstrate ways in which e-learning supports this vision with New Zealand's priority learners in mind.

ERO encourages schools to develop systems, processes and connections that:

- shift the focus to student-centered learning
- knowledgeably implement a responsive and rich curriculum
- use assessment information to know about, and plan for, students' learning.

Priority learners and e-learning

It is important to know your ākonga/students, and make connections with parents/whānau to enable them to support their children's learning. When learning and communication needs are identified, specific technologies can be employed to transform opportunities for ākonga, teachers, whānau, and the wider school community.

The <u>e-Learning Planning Framework</u> (eLPF) provides schools and teachers with a self-review tool for schools to:

- gather evidence about ako (practice in the classroom, and beyond the classroom)
- evaluate the effectiveness of e-learning programmes in meeting the needs of priority learners
- identify the resources and services needed to build capability to meet the needs of priority learners
- plan strategically to develop whanaugatanga (relationships with students and the school community), and personalised learning and teaching opportunities to meet the needs of all students.
