Pathways

Pathway planning for English Language Learners (ELLs) is a futurefocused process. Knowing the aspirations of ELLs and their families/whānau is essential for course design and pathway planning. Those wanting to study at university must have University Entrance (UE) literacy as well as the requisite number of credits.

From 2016, University of Auckland students will need to fulfil an academic English language requirement (AELR) for entry into all its undergraduate programmes. English for Academic Purposes standards US 22750 and US 22751 will contribute to meeting the AELR. There are many future pathways students may take. It is important to provide a range of opportunities as UE is only one measure of success. In 2012, 48.7% of all school leavers achieved UE (Education Counts July 2013). Other measures of success need to be promoted and valued.

In recognition of multiple routes to future employment, the Ministry of Education, in partnership with Industry Training Federations, has developed Vocational Pathways under the Youth Guarantee banner. Priority learners and English Language standards

The new English Language standards have been so named to make them more inclusive of students who might not be sitting in ESOL classes. In 2012, there were 2750 results for ESOL standards for Pasifika students. In the same year, there were 11,135 results for ESOL standards for Asian students.

It might be worth considering whether bilingual Pasifika students in your school should be having access to these standards, and the learning that sits behind them. Māori students who have learnt within a Kura Kaupapa might well benefit from accessing them too.

English Language (EL) unit standard moderation 2014

Teachers who are assessing students against the English Language (EL) unit standards will be pleased to know that EL assessment tasks, schedules and assessed work can be submitted to NZQA for feedback-only moderation this year. This process was useful for teachers trialing EAP unit standards last year and is therefore recommended. Schools must complete an online template before 30 May if they wish to engage in this.

Formal moderation of EL unit standards will start in 2015, so this year's school moderation plans include only ESOL unit standards. However, teachers can request, via their Principal's Nominee, that one or more ESOL unit standards in their moderation plan be replaced with EL unit standards for formal moderation. Requests for clarification

The opportunity to make requests for clarification is now available for EL unit standards. ESOL teachers can ask specific questions of moderators about how to interpret the new standards. Moderators will then refer teachers to any existing clarifications document, send an individual response to queries or update the clarifications document as required.

English Language (EL) unit standards assessment Virtual Learning Network (VLN) group

In the last newsletter we wrote about the Secondary ESOL Online English Language unit standards sub group on the VLN. We set up this up as a closed group to support and allow teachers to freely exchange ideas and share resources out of the public arena, while preparing for the transition to EL unit standards. Since that time the group has developed to include over 57 members and many people have contributed resources.

ESOL unit standards are expiring in December 2015 but it is strongly recommended that you adopt EL unit standards by next year. It is currently acceptable to assess ELLs using either EL or ESOL unit standards or both.

We welcome new members to the VLN EL US subgroup. If you wish to join, please contact your regional facilitator. It is particularly important that this remains a restricted/closed site so that any assessment resources shared can be used by teachers without the worry of accessibility by students.

That is why when we invite teachers to join the site we ask you to provide a profile of yourselves. A number of teachers have included only their names. It is very important that you provide at least your name, school and position within the school, so that we, the facilitators, can be confident about whom we are inviting into the group. Moreover, well-developed profiles help the cohesiveness of the group, aiding networking.

Four teaching and learning modules have been developed by the Ministry of Education for the English for Academic Purposes (EAP) standards. These formative EAP resources on TKI are designed to be used together. They recycle language to provide multiple opportunities for students to practise and transfer skills. For example, the listening teaching and learning sequence will ensure students have the background and skills that will enable them to better cope with the demands of the reading activities. It is expected that teachers will select activities according to the needs of their students.
