2016 SSA national workshop feedback

The Secondary Student Achievement (SSA) national workshops for Learning Languages were held in terms one and two with the focus on student focused learning.

Feedback from the workshops indicated that teachers found the workshop content very useful and directly applicable to their classrooms.

"The delivery method in itself role-modelled a great way to deliver differentiated lessons in multi-level classes using online learning stations."

"The use of self-selected activities based on a number of different 'learning stations' meant that we were able to work at our own pace on areas of greatest need or interest. A very good model of 21st century teaching and learning."

NZALT Conference, Whakatū/Nelson



The theme of the NZALT conference for 2016 was 'Waves of Change'. The focus was on 'What is 21st century language learning? How will we flip our thinking?' These were the central questions framing the conference, with an overarching theme of information communication learning technology (ICLT) and its use in the classroom.


So how did it all go? As evidenced by the following comment, it seems that the 'waves of change' will definitely be moving through many learning languages classrooms in term 3.

"It was such a success. All presenters were well prepared and sessions were varied. The choice of keynote speakers was inspired, as all three were enthusiastic and ... inspiring! Food delicious, lots of coffee, welcoming environment to allow for chatting with fellow teachers. Lots of humour as well.

I hope that you feel the countless hours of preparation have been worthwhile; you really have presented a wide-ranging learning opportunity for teachers to make positive change for their language students."

The conference was opened by Mayor Rachael Reese with an excellent speech about the importance of diversity. This was followed by an inspiring speech from Andrea Ewing on how valuable and important language learning is for her as a criminal prosecutor with the war tribunal.

Our three keynote speakers then set the tone for the conference with Associate Professor Steve Thorne starting off with a superb presentation around how we can create environments using technology in which there are "high levels of effortful engagement", as this is what results in learning.



Dr Rachel Hawkes followed with an inspiring keynote presentation on 'Learning to talk and talking to learn: the role of teacher and student talk in the foreign languages classroom'. The presentation was packed full of reasons why we need to develop more use of spontaneous talk in the languages classroom, how to do this, and the importance of humour.

Professor Hayo Reinders' thought provoking keynote, 'The Internet of things and its implications for Language Education and Research' left us with much to ponder as we look at mobile technologies, their augmentation and their ubiquity. He left us with these questions:

What will be the impact of mobility on our field?

And how about augmentation and ubiquity?

Who will be teaching, and what?

What (additional/different) skills will we need to develop?
